## Officers Meet-Away from the Scene

### Officer Died at Bristol Hospital Half An Hour After Shooting—Police Take Up Trail When Abandoned Car Is Found in Waterbury.

## WATERBURY YOUTH NAMED BROPHY INVOLVED IN KILLING

### Large Forces of Police Are Searching Woods in Vicinity of Chestnut Hill in Waterbury.

Policeman James McNamee was fatally shot at 9:15 o'clock last night at the Ebb Filling Station, corner of Washington street and Stafford avenue, in Forestville, about five hours after he was rushed in Dunn's ambulance, and given surgical attention by Dr. B. N. Whipple.

Officer McNamee was on duty as usual and when he ran into the center of Forestville at 8:15 o'clock he was told by Captain Guckin to be on the lookout for a Franklin car bearing the license Conn. 21768, stolen in New Britain from Dr. William T. Stimmerly. He continued on his beat to the north and when he approached the junction of Washington street and Stafford avenue he saw the Franklin car at the Ebb Filling station. The rear mirror was bent in a manner to obscure the number. He crossed to the station, looked at the number and the car was seen to be a Franklin in the tank. A young man was standing near the car while the filling was in operation.

Officer McNamee approached the driver of this car, saying, "It belongs to my father," replied the young man. Officer McNamee, "We have a complaint about this car so I will have to take you to the station." He then made a motion to turn getting into the car when the officer stepped on the gas and drove away. Officer McNamee fell prone to the ground. The driver stepped on the gas and turned into Stafford avenue. The youth ran after it. The car stopped a distance off and backed up. It then sped off to the north on Stafford avenue.

In the meantime the Ebb brother, who had been with Officer McNamee and carried him to the station. Police headquarters were also alerted. The youth was summoned. While lying on the ground he said, "I am Jimmie McNamee said to the Ebb brothers, "Boys, I'm done for." On arrival at the station he was taken to the hospital where he died. Whipple at once gave him an examination and knew that he was beyond the aid of the doctors. He did all that he could to alleviate his suffering and administered morphine to ease his pain. When asked whether they were youths or older persons, he informed that they were youths. He grew gradually weaker till he died, retaining consciousness until the ambulance arrived. He breathed his last.

Captain Guckin immediately directed officers to search the main arteries of the city in the hope of heading off the gunman. The search was made through the city with the message distributed to the men on the telephone and also posted in nearby towns to be on the lookout for the shooting car. He also notified the state police.

Immediately on hearing of the shooting at the Ebb filling station, police came to this city and worked on the case with local officers. The shooting occurred at the Tyler Garage in Cheshire had been held up about half an hour before the shooting occurred at Forestville, and while two of the men held the garments at bay the other two ran to the north and made a get away to the north. It was believed that the same men were the ones who were shot at the Ebb Filling station and that they were about to stage a holdup near the Ebb filling station.

The shooting shortly before 9 o'clock, Mrs. Mary Pandorf, of 441 Maple street, New Britain, while on her way to her employment in the Humano Manufacturing Company, factory, picked up a Herrington-Hardwood touring car, with a driver, fully loaded, on a lawn about 200 feet north of the scene

in on the men. Early this afternoon, however, half a hundred police were still searching, having a car on the loose.

Police went to the outer end of North Main street, at 10:15 of this morning after having visited other sections of the city in search of McNamee's slayers. Search for the Bristol patrolman killers was centered in Waterbury when the Boston car the bandits used last night was found abandoned in the vicinity of Waterbury, at the corner of Cherry and Camp Street. After the bandits had robbed a filling station at Cheshire last evening they drove to Bristol where they shot Patrolman McNamee when he questioned them as they entered another station. They apparently drove to Waterbury and then quit the car here. No cars were stolen.

Quick on the trigger he unloading his automatic in the direction of the Bristol policeman. Carrying a belt of cartridges the bandit, driving as he retreated, he slipped through a yard and into the rugged brush land where he reloaded his automatic as he whirled away.
